"Family comes first and then my friends," said Wallenfeldt, who spent a lot of time babysitting his sister Brenda's children.

"I spent the day with family, and friends at night." Wallenfeldt said. "I have a lot of high school friends from college I am going to see.

"Nothing big," added Wallenfeldt on Sept. 16. "I just want to enjoy my family and all my great friends before going back."

Although not looking forward to returning to Camp Victory, located near Baghdad, Wallenfeldt said it's a job he must do, and do it proudly.

"If you are over there doing you're job, there's a better chance of nothing's going to happen over here," he said.

Wallenfeldt's unsure what his job will be when he returns to Iraq, He's had four jobs in the six-month stint there so far. Two weeks before his leave, Wallenfeldt worked on patrolling a zone in a Humvee.

"That's just one of many jobs I've had," said Wallenfeldt, who serves as a cook during his regular National Guard duties.

"People from the Philippines are doing the cooking, so they got us (cooks) doing other jobs," he said.

He has worked in several different platoons, including one with fellow Galvan Derrick Glisan.

Another job, perhaps the most interesting according to Wallenfeldt, was a surveillance task.

"I operated a camera on the top of one of the pal-

aces over there," he explained. "I watched from air to ground to make sure everything was okay.

"I had a radio next to me and they would call me if they had spotted something," he continued. "We had a map on the computer so we had things pretty well covered."

For relaxation on the base, Wallenfeldt said he just likes to spend time "talking to my friends on the Internet."

"I don't get involved in a lot of things," he said.
"There's volleyball, softball and basketball but I'd rather just pop in a movie or two and relax, talk to my friends."

Wallenfeldt, an avid runner, has also participated in several races.

"I did well in them but kinda got away from running a lot," Wallenfeldt said.

He said the heat took a toll on him, along with his work schedule.

Wallenfeldt knows he will have to re-adjust once again when he arrives in Iraq.

"One thing you know, though, is that things don't change." he said. "You're always going to have the conflicts."

Wallenfeldt says he's enjoyed his job so far.

"It's been a good experience so far,' he stated. "I have met all kinds of people – from military to civilians. That's been the best part of it. That and you're doing something to make the world a lot safer. That's rewarding."

As for future plans, he's unsure.

"We'll see when the time comes" he said. "Right now, I want to enjoy my time here (at Galva). And then I have a job to do."
