Newman, Commander of the Unit, said, "but for now those are their orders."

The public is invited to all ceremonies. In the event of inclement weather, the farewell ceremony will be held inside the Dixon Armory.


Kuba, the platoon leader, has been in the National Guard for 15 years. According to Newman, most of the activated soldiers are specialists, have six years of service or less and have a college education.
